


Report by Roy Wanta:

Nicodemus

It has been about six years since the first time I met Nicodemus. When he came to see me, it was a life-and-death situation. He had a tumor along his jaw line large enough to the point of cutting off his air supply, and he was have difficulty eating. The growth got bigger each week. We had put him in a hospital to have the cancerous growth removed by surgery. Having the help of Pastor John and working with the doctors at the time was an experience. After the successful surgery, Nicodemus was able to go back to school and even has developed an ability to preach.

However, these past couple of months, his lower jaw has started aching a lot and hurts to the point that it is keeping him up at nights. He has been told, after going to the doctors, that the surgery could not be done as well in Nigeria as if it were done in the United States. Without insurance, there is no way we can afford to bring Nicodemus here for surgery. For now, we will have to try to get assistance for the surgery and to keep him healthy before any cancer comes back and attacks him again. The doctors that did the surgery six years ago were a medical team from the US, who are no longer there. If there is anyone that can do something for this young man or knows of a medical team that might be going to Nigeria, please let us know.







Needs of the Women

If anyone has any way we can help the widows buy seed so that they can grow a garden at the site, let us know. As you know from our last newsletter, the well is in and now we have a pump house to secure the well. We still need to get a generator, which would cost about \$600 USD, that can stay in the pump house. Then water could be used for drinking or watering the seeds at any time.

Yes, it not unusual for electricity to be out for two months or more. About the last week of each month, before the billing comes due, power comes on for one to two hours a day and then, when the new month starts, it is barely on again.

School Registration

I went to the Ministry of Education and have obtained the government form. So the process has commenced. The Area Inspector of Education

will lead a team to the school site one month from today to know how prepared we are. We are required by law to have a permanent site and a block building that will contain three classrooms. Note, the block building is according to their measurement specification of 20 by 50 feet. We are also required to have a water supply and to construct a standard water system toilet. Thank God we have water at the site now. So, we are faced with the problem of raising a three-classroom block building and constructing toilets. \$3000 USD will finish this project to 90%. This is the number one priority in our next step for the school and orphanage. We will put the building up with partitions for classrooms and use it as a church, too. This would be a multi-purpose building which could also be used on Saturdays by the widows to earn money by grinding cassava and corn if we are able to purchase a grinding machine.

Cataract Surgery Update

Georgena Nwonu, the widow with the cataract problem, has started her appointments again. At her June 18th appointment, we may be told if she can proceed to have the surgery.
